I knew the League was a team of highly trained volunteers who were not shy about digging in and getting their hands dirty to push changes forward. I could not have imagined the full extent of the League's far-reaching impact until I got to know my fellow members.

It is an exciting time for our League. This year we voted to establish a new governance structure, one that creates a strategic Board of Directors and a day-to-day operationally-focused Management Council. Our new model will allow for better management of one of the largest Leagues in the country while also creating more leadership opportunities for our members. Thank you for your support of this important milestone for our League!

We have a rich history of touching lives and carrying our League experiences with us into our jobs, homes and additional volunteer opportunities. These experiences change the lives of the women and children who we help and enrich the lives of our members at the same time.

Thank you for investing your time and talents to impact women and children across Wake County. More than 700 women volunteer over 21,000 hours annually, directly serving women and children. Examples of our efforts include:

- preparing new moms to care for their babies;
- providing clothing through our Bargain Box vouchers program at Cameron Village for job interviews and back to school for families for whom these essentials are not available;
- packing meals for children to take home on the weekend when school food is not available and meals may be scarce;
- enhancing elementary and middle school children's confidence through one-on-one homework help;
- and leading therapeutic horseback riding programs for children with disabilities.

We continue to shape new leaders and provide educational opportunities for Wake County nonprofits and businesses. Through programs such as Community Connect, our award-winning Capital Leadership Initiative and our third annual Women's Empowerment Conference, we continue to demonstrate our commitment to sharpening and advancing the skills of League members and community friends and partners.

The Junior League of Raleigh continues its 86-year history of providing monetary support to community agencies. Funds raised during events like A Shopping SPREE! and Belk's Love My League fashion night enable the work that we do and provide the resources to award grants to Wake County community agencies that exhibit a need and have a strong impact on the community. Our beloved Bargain Box has returned to profitability this year thanks to the dedication and commitment of our membership. The next time you are in Cameron Village, stop by Bargain Box and check out our clothing, household goods and books. It will be hard to leave empty handed!

Thank you for your passion and enthusiasm for building on our rich history of service as we continue to partner with the community to make Wake County a better place for children and their families. Together, we will continue to impact the women and children who need it the most!

#JLRIMPACT IN ACTION!



Our Communications & Strategies Council brings the JLR brand to life. This year, we reinvigorated a brand that is vibrant and fun.

We built a new website that is modern and responsive.

We designed and launched a community newsletter (The Leaflet) that shares League stories of impact with partners, friends and businesses on a semi-annual basis.

We ran social media campaigns like we've never run before, extending our reach to more than 30,000 homes and users across the Triangle in a single campaign.

Finally, we produced an award-winning impact video that highlights our impact in a professional and personal way.



At the heart of all things Junior League are our community teams. These teams performed to over 1,000 second graders, showing them the importance of being kind to others. They visited new mothers, ensuring they are keeping both themselves and their newborns healthy. They taught children everything from cooking skills and pre-calculus to balancing a checkbook and how to recognize dangerous people and situations. They collected over 5,000 pounds of food, packing 2,500 bags for hungry kids at Lacy and Hunter Elementary Schools to take home with them on the weekends and over holidays.

Collectively, we volunteered over 7,500 hours directly within our community, in over 70 schools, nursing homes and partner agencies.



In 2015-2016, we hosted 3 signature fundraisers: A Shopping SPREE!, Belk Love My League and an inaugural Touch-A-Truck event.

We also began plans for the N.C. Governor's Inaugural Ball, which the Junior League of Raleigh will host in January 2017.

We continued to sell our Cookbook, *You're Invited Back*, through different local events. And we continue to promote our Julia Jones Daniels Center for Community Leadership as a low-cost option for nonprofit partners in need of rental facilities.

Finally, our Community Funding team awarded Legacy Grants and helped secure grants and in-kind donations to support our community teams.



With approximately 110 members serving our Active, Sustainer and Provisional Members, the Membership Council engages our League's members throughout their League membership and at all steps in their personal lives.

This year we welcomed 160 new members, educating and training them on what it means to be a member of the Junior League of Raleigh.

We recognized 36 new members that transferred into our League.

We hosted 25 member events, and connected with more than 80 members having life events such as births and marriages. And we recognized over 130 members for their efforts supporting our community and our League.



Our training council focuses on 3 areas: to provide interesting and relevant training opportunities to our membership; to educate the greater Raleigh community on the League's training mission through our Capital Leadership Institute and Community Connect; and to increase membership satisfaction through well run meetings.

In 2015-2016, more than 50 community members participated in training through our Community Connect program. Now in its 6th year, our CLI program graduated 20 participants. And more than 750 League members were trained through internal training programs.

Through trainings presented this year, our members are even more poised to effectively lead in their places of employment, homes, and in the community.



In 1930, 87 women decided to make a difference. Today, the Junior League of Raleigh unites more than 1,600+ women committed to promoting volunteerism, developing the potential of women and improving the community through the effective action of trained volunteers.

AVENTWEST CHILDREN'S MENTORING (AWCM)



AWCM began in 1999 as an after-school tutoring program for academically at-risk students living in the AventWest Community in southwest Raleigh. The Junior League of Raleigh has been partnering with AWCM since 2006 to provide enrichment activities and tutoring on a weekly basis.

BACKPACK BUDDIES



In 2010, the Junior League of Raleigh partnered with the Inter-Faith Food Shuttle to establish a Backpack Buddies program. Since then our program has steadily grown from serving just a handful of children to providing healthy, supplemental nutrition to more than 400 children each month. These children are better prepared to learn and grow thanks to the healthy weekend meals and snacks provided by JLR and our generous donors.

BRENTWOOD BOYS & GIRLS CLUB



Founded in 2006 by the Boys & Girls Club of Wake County with a monetary gift from the Junior League of Raleigh, the club serves at-risk Hispanic youth. League volunteers throughout fall, winter and spring teach students life skills, provide one-on-one homework help and assist with a variety of educational and creative activities.

HELPING HORSE



Founded in 1989, Helping Horse is a therapeutic riding program serving physically, mentally and/or emotionally disabled youth throughout Wake County. The Junior League of Raleigh supports Helping Horse by providing volunteers to serve as horse leaders and side-walkers at weekly riding lessons during the traditional school year.

HERITAGE PARK

Since 2001, the Junior League of Raleigh has teamed with CISWC (Communities in Schools Wake County) to provide volunteer and financial support at its Heritage Park Community Learning Center. Annually, 30 League members work at the center, located in a downtown Raleigh Housing Authority neighborhood, to help and encourage students in grades K-12 with their schoolwork, stressing the importance of education and goal-setting.

This year's Funding Council, and our members and donors who participated in League fundraisers, were a perfect example of women and organizations using their time, talents and treasure to make the world a little better.

After a tough initial start to the fiscal year, **Bargain Box** saw a major turnaround in sales. Bargain Box also became a connection point for the League as a whole this year, as many councils held socials in the store and open work shifts invited members to come together to help out our oldest fundraiser.

With an outstanding year of attracting sponsors and exhibitors, **A Shopping SPREE!** produced the highest grossing SPREE! ever! **Love My League** was given a new name and format for their event, and team members worked hard to make the event a fun and successful night! Our **Inaugural Ball** team, who have already spent countless hours working on the January 2017 event, shook things up by moving the Ball back to its roots at NC State's Talley Student Union and Reynolds Coliseum!

Team **Annual Fund** also had a stellar year, with a reinvigorated focus on the end-of-year appeal, educating members on the importance of giving and a brand new event – **Touch-A-Truck®**. This year our **Cookbook** team prepared delicious samples and saw robust sales during SPREE!, while also working on plans to roll cookbook sales into Annual Fund for the 2016-17 League year.

The Center for Community Leadership (CCL) team continued to help keep League costs down by helping to staff events held by CCL renters. And finally, Community Funding strengthened the connection between funding and community teams by working with businesses on innovative ways to give to and partner with the League's community teams.



KEEPING MEMBERS INVOLVED & INFORMED ON LOCAL ISSUES

The Junior League of Raleigh's Government Relations and Public Affairs (GRAPA) team is focused on keeping League members informed about and involved in the governmental process. Their mission is two-fold: educating League members about government and building a positive relationship between local government and the League. This year, GRAPA took on a significant community outreach effort by hosting voter registration drives. Partnering with StepUp and Advanced Community Health, they have made it very simple for people who may not have the resources readily available to register to vote. Talk about impact!

One of the team's most significant events is the Women in Public Leadership Panel. Hosted annually by the League, this panel brings together significant women leaders from across the Triangle to share insights on public service and discuss issues on a local level. This year's Women in Public Leadership Panel did not disappoint.

On April 5th, JLR hosted four of Raleigh's most influential women to discuss the importance of public service. The esteemed panel included: The Honorable Cheri Beasley, Congresswoman Renee Ellmers, District Attorney Lorrin Freeman and Clerk of Court Jennifer Knox.

As GRAPA Co-chair Lauren Golden stated, "every North Carolinian deserves to have their voice heard in 2016". We are proud to have team GRAPA as a resource in the upcoming elections.



FUNDRAISING FOR OUR COMMUNITY

A SHOPPING SPREE! | Amid pops of pink and green and holiday decorations, nearly 12,000 Triangle shoppers strolled along black carpets with bright green tote bags tucked under their arms, taking in the sights and sounds of the 182 exhibitors lining the floor of the Raleigh Convention Center. This year marked the first time in event history that businesses with storefronts in Wake County were allowed to exhibit at SPREE!. As the League's signature fundraising event, proceeds from SPREE! fund the Junior League of Raleigh's annual Legacy Fund awards and other community projects that reinforce the League's focus on promising youth. **In 2015, Legacy Fund grants of \$5,000 were presented to The Diaper Train, Kidznotes and COR-RAL Riding Academy.**

LOVE MY LEAGUE | Models dressed in today's fashion trends. Kids on the Block puppets. A clear welcome to the annual Love My League shopping extravaganza at Belk Crabtree! Surrounded by great music, tasty appetizers, cold beverages and the latest in fashion trends, it was an evening of shopping to support the Junior League of Raleigh and our programs.

BARGAIN BOX | As one of the League's oldest fundraisers, the Bargain Box is a fun place to donate and shop. For our members, it is a convenient location to donate gently used clothing, jewelry, shoes, home decorations and more. For local residents, it is a great place to shop. Bargain Box is also an important resource to our community. Each year, more than 70 local agencies receive vouchers to support families in need. This year, Bargain Box found creative way to extend its partnerships with Wake County businesses. Bargain Box established a partnership with the North Raleigh Arts & Creative Theatre to provide clothing for a production of The Wedding Singer.

TOUCH A TRUCK | On May 14th, the Junior League of Raleigh hosted our inaugural Touch-A-Truck® event at the Julia Jones Center for Community Leadership. Promises of trucks and public service vehicles, bouncy houses, face painting and food trucks drew crowds of over 900 to the CCL for an afternoon of fun. Children of all ages enjoyed exploring and "touching" trucks from a variety of sources. Touch-A-Truck is an educational community event that provides children with a hands-on opportunity to see and touch heavy machinery and meet the people who build, protect and serve the local community.
