Did you notice that our Headquarters has a new name? The sign over the door now reads "Julia Jones Daniels Center for Community Leadership." You may not know who Julia Jones Daniels is or why our building was dedicated to her last year, but you should. You should know Julia, and you should be proud every time you walk under that sign.

Julia is one of us. She represents the very best of us. A member of the Junior League of Raleigh for 58 years, Julia has been a guardian of our work, our reputation and our legacy.

"Julia Daniels embodies the mission of the League, which is to train women to improve their community as volunteers," stated Jennie Hayman, Past President of the League and current Sustainer Adviser. "Julia has been an incredible example to all of us for many years. It is very fitting that we now name this building for her."

Within the League, Julia has shone. Long known for her innate ability to motivate others to serve, Julia found an outlet for this passion in JLR. As an active member, she researched and recommended the formation of the Arts Council of Raleigh, the Mordecai Square Historic Society and the Boys Club of Raleigh. As President of JLR, she led our growing League to relocate our Headquarters and hire our first paid staff member to advance JLR's operations. Later, Julia served as National Association of Junior Leagues of America Nominating Chairman. As a Sustainer, she has been involved in capital campaigns and continues to mentor active members. Julia has done it all.

Raleigh Hall of Fame. The Order of the Long Leaf Pine. Most Powerful Woman in the Triangle. The North Carolina Award for Public Service. Thomas S. Kenan, III Leadership in the Arts Award. These are just some of the awards that show the impact that Julia has had on her community and her state. She has been tireless in her commitment to women and children's health, the advancement of the arts and the preservation of cultural and natural history. We live in a better world because of Julia.

Always a gracious Southern gentlewoman, Julia admitted to the crowd at the dedication ceremony in November that she nearly drove through a red light the first time she passed by the building and saw her name affixed to the side.



"I will never get over the fact that I have a building named for me when it should be named for all of you," Julia said.

The next time you cross the threshold of the building, look up at the sign. Smile, nod and think to yourself, "Thank you, Julia." Our League is what it is today because of women like you.

Amid pops of pink and green and holiday decorations, nearly 12,000 Triangle shoppers took in the sights and sounds of the 182 exhibitors lining the floor of the Raleigh Convention Center. A Shopping SPREE!, the Junior League of Raleigh's four-day annual shopping event fundraiser, ushered in the holiday season with a spotlight on community.

This year marked the first time in event history that businesses with storefronts in Wake County were allowed to exhibit at SPREE!. Last year, League membership voted for a revision to the bylaws that would allow for this change, creating an opportunity to strengthen ties with local businesses; as a result, 42 local exhibitors were able to feature their wares on the shopping floor this year.

As the League's signature fundraising event, proceeds from SPREE! fund the annual Legacy Fund grants and other community projects that reinforce the League's focus on promising youth. At the December 2015 GMM, Legacy Fund grants of \$5,000 each were presented to The Diaper Train, Kidznotes and CORRAL Riding Academy.
